RE: Care Transitions Program Announced as Part of HHS Partnership for

**Patients Initiative** 

**DATE:** April 12, 2011

Today as part of the launch of the Partnership for Patients at the National Press Club, Health and Human Services Secretary Sebelius and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Administrator Berwick announced the availability of funding for the new Community-based Care Transitions Program. The Care Transitions initiative is critical to addressing the second of the two goals of the Partnership for Patients:

**Keep hospital patients from getting injured or sicker**. By the end of 2013, reduce preventable hospital-acquired conditions by 40 percent compared to 2010.

**Help patients heal without complications**. By the end of 2013, preventable complications during a transition from one care setting to another would be decreased so that all hospital readmissions would be reduced by 20 percent compared to 2010.

The new Community-based Care Transitions Program, administered through the CMS Innovation Center, will provide \$500 million in funding to community-based organizations that partner with eligible hospitals for care transition services that include timely, culturally, linguistically-competent post-discharge education, medication review and management, and patient-centered self-management support within 24 hours of discharge.
